

Sheffield ATM MISSIONS Our crew responded to 404 missions in the first three months of 2024, making it the busiest start to a year ever. During one busy period, they were called to Incidents from 25 February to 4 March responded to by 47 incidents. Road traffic collisions, accidental injuries, agricultural injuries and the LNAA crew on board our cardiac arrests were some of the missions they attended in just nine days. helicopter and critical care cars.

SUN 25 FEBRUARY

- 10.51am: Helicopter dispatched to a medical emergency in Lincoln. Crew treat a patient at scene.
- 1.38pm: Helicopter flies crew to a cardiac arrest at a home in Cleethorpes. Patient stabilised and escorted to Grimsby's Diana Princess of Wales Hospital.
- 4.06pm: Another emergency for the helicopter crew as they attend an RTC at Market Rasen, Lincolnshire. Pain relief given to patient at scene before airlifting to Hull Royal Infirmary.
- 8.27pm: It takes 11 minutes to fly to Arnold, Nottingham to attend a patient with head injuries.



MON 26 FEBRUARY

10.59 am: Helicopter called to an agricultural injury at Scotter,

Scunthorpe. Crew treat a patient and airlift to Hull Royal Infirmary.



8.36pm: Crew on the critical care car attend a cardiac arrest at Newark. Team sedate a patient and administer life-saving drugs before escorting to Lincoln County Hospital.

TUE 27 FEBRUARY

- 7.58am: Critical care car called to an RTC at Market Rasen. Lincolnshire and crew treat a patient with multiple injuries. Once stable, patient escorted to Hull Royal Infirmary.
- 2.53pm: Crew dispatched to a major RTC near Spilsby. Lincolnshire involving East Midlands Ambulance Service and two neighbouring Air Ambulance crews. Working together, LNAA crew treat two

patients at the scene who are escorted to separate hospitals.

WED 28 FEBRUARY

- 1.30am: Critical care car transport crew to attend a medical emergency in Lincoln. Patient stabilised and escorted to Lincoln County Hospital.
- 9.17am: Helicopter flies crew to treat a medical incident in Grimsby.

THU 29 FEBRUARY

2.58pm: Notts critical care car tasked to an accidental injury in Nottingham. Patient treated for rib fractures and escorted to Nottingham's Queen's Medical Centre.



4.52pm: Helicopter flies crew to Louth to treat a cardiac arrest. Patient stabilised and escorted to Lincoln County Hospital.

FRI 1 MARCH



- 10.06am: Helicopter called to a cardiac arrest at Spilsby, Lincolnshire.
- 10.16am: 10 minutes later, helicopter responds to another cardiac arrest.
- 12.06 pm: Helicopter called to a farming injury near Spalding, Lincolnshire. Team sedate and administer life-saving drugs, then airlifts patient to Nottingham's Queen's Medical Centre.
- 1.41pm: Notts critical care car crew treat a cardiac arrest in Nottingham. Patient intubated and escorted immediately to Nottingham's Queen's Medical Centre.
- 4.59pm: Notts critical care car called again to a house fire at Nottingham. Crew treat a patient for burns and smoke inhalation before

handing to trauma team at Nottingham's Queen's Medical Centre.

SAT 2 MARCH

- 8.29pm: Critical care car called to an incident in Lincoln.
- 11.27 pm: The crew are called to attend a cardiac arrest in Lincoln.

SUN 3 MARCH

1.45am: Critical care car called to an incident near Ollerton, Nottinghamshire. Crew treat a patient for injuries sustained after a fall before escorting to Nottingham's Queen's Medical Centre.



MON 4 MARCH

6.52am: Critical care car called to a multiple RTC near Boston, Lincolnshire. Working with colleagues from East Midlands

Ambulance Service, crew treat three patients who are then transported to Boston's Pilgrim Hospital and Nottingham's Queen's Medical Centre.



- 8.45 am: Critical care car called to an RTC in Grantham, Lincolnshire and treat a patient for chest injuries before escorting to Nottingham's Queen's Medical Centre.
- 3.30 pm: Helicopter called to Skegness to attend the third RTC of the day. Crew treat one patient for injuries and transport them to Boston's Pilgrim Hospital.



5+ MISSIONS A DAY

We responded to, on average, 5+ missions a day between January and March.

47 INCIDENTS

Our Notts cricital care car was called out the most, responding to 17 incidents. Our helicopter and Lincs critical care car crews were both called out to 15 incidents. 25 incidents were in Lincolnshire, 19 in Nottinghamshire, 2 in Derbyshire and 1 in Leicestershire.

27 PATIENTS

Our crews responded to 22 medical emergencies. 10 road traffic incidents and 9 accidental injuries. Patients were transferred to 5 different hospitals including Nottingham's Queen's Medical Centre, and Hull Royal Infirmary.

9 EMERGENCY **ANAESTHETICS**

Our crew administered emergency anaesthetics to 9 patients. They also gave blood transfusions to 3 patients.

30 YEARS OF CARING FOR PATIENTS

1994

A young boy needed LNAA to airlift him to hospital when speed was essential.

"If they hadn't flown me to Queen's Medical Centre I probably would have died."

Six-year-old Shaun's heart stopped beating three times. LNAA ensured he reached a specialist hospital in record time.

Shaun was with his family shopping when he suddenly slipped and banged his head causing a seizure. Doctors at Boston's Pilgrim Hospital fought to stabilise him each time his heart stopped beating.

The two-hour journey by road ambulance from Boston to Nottingham's QMC, was deemed too risky, so Lincs & Notts Air Ambulance was called. In less than 30 minutes, he was safely airlifted to hospital and into Intensive Care.

1998

James' left arm had to be amputated but the speed which LNAA airlifted him to hospital, gave him the best outcome.

"The quick delivery to hospital saved my life. Nothing else compares to what LNAA does."

James had been harvesting potatoes on a farm near Retford, Nottinghamshire. His arm got caught on the harvester machine and he was pulled into it.

People battled to free him for over two hours. The LNAA doctor administered pain relief and remained by his side the whole time, ready to amputate if necessary.

LNAA flew James to Sheffield's Northern General Hospital within nine minutes, a journey that takes an hour by road. Sadly, surgeons could not save his arm.

2002

When bike racing goes wrong, the consequences can be devastating.



Chris and his family

"The Lincs & Notts Air Ambulance was the link that enabled my life to be saved."

Chris was an up-and-coming championship racer, competing in his first full season. He was racing at Cadwell Park when his world went black.

Chris crashed at 120mph, flipping in the air, landing 78 metres down the track. His brain hit his skull causing intracranial bleeding, his arm was pulled from its socket and he had no pulse.

LNAA's doctor put Chris into a medically induced coma to prevent further brain damage and allow the clinical crew to take over his breathing. He was then airlifted to Nottingham's Queen's Medical Centre.

2010

A freak accident changed motorcyclist Neil's life forever.

"The speed of the helicopter makes a huge difference to the patient's recovery."

Neil was with friends, looking forward to Butlin's MCN Live Motorcycle Show. Whilst travelling slowly on his bike to his chalet, he decided not to put his helmet on. He hit a speed ramp, fell backwards and the bike landed on top of him.

Neil suffered a broken collarbone, hand and ribs along with chest, lung and head injuries. LNAA's helicopter was dispatched, and the crew arrived in rapid time, treating Neil with life-saving drugs before airlifting to hospital. Fourteen years later, Neil's memory is still affected and there are things he finds difficult to recall.

2016

Tragedy struck lorry driver John when he was hit by a lorry on the busy A1.



"Without the intervention of the Lincs & Notts Air Ambulance. I would have either died or suffered worse injuries."

John, from Swaton, Sleaford, had left the weighbridge near Ferry Bridge Services to join the A1 south. Sensing a fault with his lorry, he stopped on the hard shoulder near Blyth to investigate. Unfortunately, whilst walking around the lorry, he was struck by another truck.

LNAA arrived within 20 minutes to find John unconscious, suffering from multiple injuries including head and spinal, and two punctured lungs. The crew acted swiftly to stabilise him before airlifting to Sheffield's Northern General Hospital.

2022

Advanced life support got Andrew's heart beating again.

"We will forever be grateful for what everyone did that day."

When Andrew suffered a cardiac arrest at Grantham Swimming Pool, the LNAA team were by his side within 15 minutes, continuing CPR started by two spectators.

They initiated advanced life support, enabling Andrew's heart to start again. He was anaesthetised, allowing LNAA's clinicians to give the best possible pre-hospital critical care before safely transporting him to the specialist cardiac unit at Lincoln County Hospital.

Andrew was in a coma for four days before having a pacemaker and internal defibrillator inserted.





OUR PARAMEDICS

Meet our three latest recruits to join our team of paramedics working at the forefront of our Helicopter Emergency Medical Service (HEMS).

Craig Blair, **HEMS Paramedic**

"I'm from Washingborough in Lincolnshire originally and throughout my career I always wanted to give HEMS a shot.





One of the most amazing things I've experienced was on the return flight from Hull, where we'd taken a seriously injured motorcyclist. We flew back over Lincoln, around the cathedral, just as the sun was setting and it was just really something, looking out over the city I grew up in. It sounds clichéd but I felt quite fortunate in that moment to be in this role, especially knowing that we'd made a difference to the patient we'd just seen. We'd been able to give him blood transfusions on scene and were able to get him to hospital quickly.


Sadly, it's a fact that given we attend so many severely unwell patients, we can't save them every time but it's such a great feeling when we can make that difference to their outcome.

The team here are so passionate and driven to continue to improve which is actually quite inspiring."



Lucy Tyrrell, **HEMS Paramedic**

"I studied paramedic science at the University of Greenwich and started my career as a paramedic in Kent. I undertook extra studies in pre-hospital medicine, inspired by the extra level of care, critical care



it's lovely because I am living closer to my family now.

"The best thing about the role is the constant drive to be and do better for patients. We are learning and growing together and it's truly a team effort to provide cutting edge, holistic care for patients and their families, during and after an incident."

I feel privileged to be trusted to help people in need. But I think that our volunteers and supporters are some of the most impressive things about the charity. We don't fly without these fundamentals and I've been inspired more than once by stories of individuals who, even in the face of adversity, have given back to the service."

Jacob Allison, HEMS Paramedic

Jacob moved around a lot as his father was in the RAF and spent many years in Lincoln and the surrounding area, attending school in Sleaford and later attending Lincoln College.

Jacob had always strived to learn by working with the best clinicians and in December 2023 he joined the crew at LNAA.

"It is a privilege being able to come to work and fly in a state-of-the-art helicopter, train to a high level of expertise and help the most unwell patients."





NOTTS CAR EXPANSION

Our Notts critical care car which was introduced in 2020 in response to patient need, is now responding to missions seven-days-a-week.

Our critical care car was brought into service after clinical data showed that there were more patients in the Notts area in need of critical care. To begin with, the car covered Thursday to Sunday which at the time were the busiest days.

Since its launch, the car has been tasked to more than 1,377 missions. As missions increase, and as many of the incidents we are called to in Nottinghamshire are in built-up areas where it is difficult for our helicopter to land, the demand for the critical care car is higher than ever.

Thanks to your support, we have been able to increase the service and reach more patients than ever.

The car will be in Nottingham and the surrounding areas between 7am and 7pm Monday to Thursday and from 7pm to 7am, Friday to Sunday. The doctor and paramedic team on board, will carry all of the same life-saving equipment that is on the helicopter.

Allan Gardner knows how vital the Notts critical care car is to residents in the county.

In February 2024, Allan (71) climbed the roof of his conservatory at his Hunger Hill Allotment to replace damaged panels, when suddenly he slipped, falling through the deteriorated Perspex and landing on

Allan said: "The pain was excruciating in my back and chest and I could hardly breathe, every time I tried to move, the pain would shoot through my body."

His injuries were so serious that LNAA was called immediately. Within 16 minutes the Notts critical care car arrived, and the doctor and paramedic were by Allan's side, providing life-saving emergency care.

Allan sustained 10 broken ribs, a collapsed lung and spent three weeks in Nottingham's Queen's Medical Centre.

He believes if the crew had not arrived so quickly in the critical care car, the outcome may have been different.

"They saved my life. The response from LNAA is quick and the doctors and paramedics can get to you quickly and sort you out before you get to hospital."

A HELIPAD, A LANCASTER AND A KOOKABURRA



On 12 May 1944, a rather special Lancaster Bomber returned to its site at RAF Waddington celebrating its 100th mission. Eighty years later it is believed LNAA's helicopter resides on that same site, celebrating its 30th birthday.

When LNAA moved over the fence from RAF Waddington to our new HQ, we needed a name for the helipad.

LNAA pilot, Capt Tim Taylor began to investigate the history of the old aircraft dispersal site which we had built our new helipad on and soon realised he had uncovered a fascinating story...

The Kookaburras

No. 467 Squadron was a Royal Australian Air Force bomber squadron based at RAF Waddington.

Equipped with Avro Lancaster bombers, its crew flew operations in Occupied Europe until the end of the Second World War.

The squadron's insignia was of a kookaburra with a snake in its beak and its motto - Recidite Adversarius Atque Ferociter, loosely translated as: "Your opponents will retreat because of your courageous attack".

And the squadron, which was part of the No. 5 Group, Bomber Command, certainly lived up to its motto as it gained a reputation for accurate raids on Germany, France and Italy between 1943 and 1945.

Every Lancaster Bomber in the squadron had its own dispersal site. These were areas adjacent to the airfield runway used for parking in widely separated positions to protect them from enemy air attacks.

Today, LNAA's helipad is on one of these dispersal sites. After discussions with RAF Waddington, LNAA was given permission to call the helipad Kookaburra in homage to the crews who operated from here

A VERY SPECIAL AIRCRAFT

On the night of 11 May 1944 a Lancaster Bomber embarked on its 100th mission, the first allied bomber to reach this milestone.

Martin Willoughby tells the story of his father's involvement on the night the Lancaster made history.

"My late father, Ted, a Bomber Command veteran, and Lancaster Engine Fitter served on the 467 Squadron's famous Lancaster S-Sugar R5868.

"The plane's nose art depicted rows of bombs, one for each operation completed. Over the course of the war, the rows grew as Sugar consistently returned from each mission.

"Flying with Bomber Command had the highest rate of attrition of any branch of the Armed Forces. If you survived, you were deemed incredibly lucky as 3,932 of the 7,377 Lancasters built were lost in action. Crews were superstitious and soon started to clamour to fly in Sugar, believing that she would bring them safely home.

"One day, when Ted was working in the cockpit, with the aircraft being loaded with bombs, he heard the sound of heavy metal hitting tarmac. Looking out, he saw airmen running in all directions. A 4,000lb bomb had fallen from the bomb bay but miraculously had not gone off!

"On 11 May 1944, Sugar left its dispersal site to undertake its 100th mission. Prior to loading the bombs. Ted chalked '100 not out' on one of them.

"Sugar went on to complete an incredible 139 operations by the end of the war.

"During the mid-1960s Ted embarked on his own mission to find his beloved plane. In 1969 he heard about a Lancaster stood at the entrance to RAF Scampton that may be Sugar. Turning into the gates, the familiar nose art with the bombs came into view. Ted could not believe it! His Lancaster had survived everything, even the scrapyard, where so many Lancasters went to after the war.

"Thanks to Ted, 'Sugar' was fully restored and today, this legend from WW2 proudly dominates the entrance to Bomber Command Hall, RAF Museum Hendon."
